



Illinois Court Gives Major Boost to Kosher Symbol, Warning to Unauthorized Users

The kosher food industry has long been plagued by the unauthorized use of kosher symbols, often causing major kosher certification agencies to spend significant sums of money to fight such abuses. Earlier this month, an Illinois federal judge found that a Chicago grocery store infringed on a trademark used by the Chicago Rabbinical Council (cRc) to distinguish kosher products, prohibiting the store and its related companies from using the mark and ordering it to pay \$1 million in damages. The ruling by the federal judge will hopefully put other food industry entities on notice that the courts recognize the value of the kosher food symbol and that unauthorized usage will not be tolerated.

In a statement, the cRc said that it is "most gratified with the court's finding on the integrity of our symbol as an important guarantee of the value of our *kashrus* certification." The statement continued: "While the court's cash award is further proof of our community's reliance on the sacred trust inherent in our symbol, the finding is comforting to those who rely on our cRc trademark as the absolute verification of the highest quality of kosher supervision."

Rabbi Sholem Fishbane, Kashrus Administrator of the cRc, explained the importance of this ruling. "The court's ruling is a victory for the timeless integrity of kosher symbols everywhere," he said. "It further strengthens the absolute sanctity of kosher certification. It will hopefully deter those who mislead the public by placing an unauthorized kosher symbol on their product."

Meor Hatorah Virtual Dinner

Yeshiva Meor Hatorah of Chicago held its annual dinner on Sunday, June 21. While the program was a virtual one, the gourmet dinner was prepared and delivered to the homes of all participants to enjoy while watching the program.

The dinner featured a Hakaras Hatov Award to Lincolnwood Jewish Congregation AG Beth Israel, currently led by Rabbi Sam Biber. In 2009, when Meor Hatorah had grown out of its previous rented quarters, AG Beth Israel offered its former building at exceptional terms. More recently, those terms were extended, providing much relief for the *yeshiva*.

Budget Wins for Children in Illinois

Illinois' Jewish children and their families have what to celebrate following the signing of a new state budget by Governor JB Pritzker on Wednesday, June 10. Despite bleak forecasts and serious obstacles, the new spending plan includes funding for Jewish day school bus transportation and private school scholarships for low-income and working-class families.

Lawmakers were bracing themselves for draconian budget cuts as state tax revenues are being decimated by the coronavirus economic fallout. Of particular concern was a \$1.173 million school transportation grant administered by Agudath Israel of Illinois (AIOI) that subsidizes the cost of busing for families who send their children to Jewish day schools in the Greater Chicago area. More than 2,000 children attending eight schools rely on the grant, which makes the service affordable. This grant has been awarded in prior years, but is something that AIOI must fight for annually. The challenge was even more daunting than usual this year, as the grant was on a list of proposed cuts shared with legislators. A strong lobbying effort by AIOI was given a big boost by supportive lawmakers who fought to protect the grant. When schools are allowed to reopen and transport students together, students will once again have subsidized busing available.

Another significant victory was the preservation of Illinois' tax credit scholarship program, the Invest in Kids Act, that benefits low-and middle-income families who choose to send their children to private schools. The program, which provides scholarships of up to nearly \$14,000 per child, has helped over 14,000 children statewide and continues to grow in popularity. Over \$20 million in scholarships has been awarded to more than 1,500 Jewish day school students since the program's inception two years ago.

Concerns about the future of the program were much more pronounced last year following newlyelected Governor Pritzker's budget proposal called for slashing the program, fulfilling a campaign pledge to "phase it out." The governor ultimately agreed that he would not make the cuts as long as the state budget included the full funding for public education, including an annual \$350 million increase, called for under a new k-12 education funding formula. When lawmakers convened in late May for an abbreviated special session, it became apparent that they simply could not appropriate the additional \$350 million, renewing fears that the program's future was in jeopardy. Due to safety concerns and a stay-at-home order, concerned constituents, lobbyists and advocacy groups were not able to access legislators and all advocacy efforts had to be conducted remotely and quickly. Once again, program allies in the state legislature worked to ensure that thousands of children would be able to attend the school of their choice.

The budget also reappropriated billions of dollars in capital grants that were part of a massive infrastructure bill that passed in 2019. Included in that bill were millions of dollars for Jewish nonprofit organizations. State Representative Yehiel Kalish (D - Chicago) and Senator Ram Villivalam (D - Chicago) worked diligently to ensure that technical changes were made to ensure these projects could be funded.

"Advocating for our community this year required a different skill set, but the strong relationships we've built over years were more important than ever," observed Rabbi Shlomo Soroka, AIOI's director of government affairs. Most people don't realize how incredibly difficult the conditions were and how much pressure legislators were under, so we're especially grateful that they made our issues their priorities."

Agudath Israel is also grateful for the tireless efforts of Representative Kalish and Senator Villivalam, under difficult conditions, to fight for funding for busing and private school scholarships, working with legislative leaders, most notably House Speaker Michael J. Madigan (D-Chicago), along with Senate President John Cullerton (D-Chicago).

Construction Of New Holocaust Memorial Underway In Vienna

Construction has begun on a Holocaust memorial in Vienna for the 65,000 Austrian Jews killed by the Nazis during World War II.

Called "The Memorial to the Jewish Children, Women and Men of Austria who were Murdered in the Shoah," the structure will be made of large slabs and include the names of the 64,000 known Jewish victims and the 1,000 whose names have been lost.

According to the memorial's website: "Descendants of those who were murdered should, without being disturbed, be able to search for the names of their relatives, to touch the letters with their hand, to say a prayer, to light a memorial candle. For all Austrians, the memorial should offer a quiet place, in which they can remember the fate of their Jewish fellow citizens and honor their lives, today and in future generations.'

The "Association for Building a Wall of Names Memorial," which spearheaded the project, says that the location of the memorial – Ostarrichi Park – was selected for its easy access to visitors and its quiet environment, "as befits a place of reverence."

The cost of the memorial is estimated at 5.3 million euros (which is about \$6 million). It is being funded in part by the Austrian government, local authorities, and donations from the Austrian business communi- Wall of Names Memorial) ty. It is slated for completion by next spring.

This Sunday, on Rosh Chodesh Sivan, a monumental event occurred around the world. No. it had nothing to do with the coronavirus, although it was affected by it. And it wasn't connected to the political fallout from the virus. Rather, it was a preparation for Kabbalas HaTorah that spanned the globe. As the wellknown Rashi reads, the acceptance of the Torah hinges on the unity of Klal Yisrael - "K'ish echad b'lev echad." And on this day, Jews from Australia to Ashdod, from France to Far Rockaway took part in the siyum on Seder Mo'ed of the weekly *Daf* learning program, Daf Hashovua. After an amazing 14 years of learning, reviewing and in-depth learning of page after page of Seder Mo'ed, this amazing milestone has finally been

The virtual *siyum* began with *divrei* brachah given by Hagaon Harav Shmuel Kamenetsky, *shlita*, who expressed his joy over the *siyum* and gave all the participants a fervent brachah to be able to continue their *shteiging*.

Harav Moshe Aharon Friedman, Rosh Mesivta of Mirrer Yerushalayim and Maggid Shiur of Daf Hashovua, then spoke, drawing from all mo'adim to weave a tapestry of our connection to the Yamim Tovim. He explained that the days of Sefirah are a form of a mo'ed, as the Ramban refers to them as a Chol Hamoed, and our job is to count



them by making each day count.

Rosh Harav Yisroel Reisman. Yeshivah. Torah Vodaath. addressed the participants, "You have the best of both worlds," enthused Harav Reisman, by learning with iyun and at a consistent pace. He explained how ol Torah that was given at Har Sinai created a new nature in the world. While mitzvos before Shavuos were merely commandments, the giving of the Torah had a profound effect on the world as the Torah changed the world.

After some slow, heartfelt songs from Reb Boruch Levine, Harav Daniel Glatstein spoke. He said that since they have joined Daf Hashovua, the *kehillah* has had a significant change for the better and have special *chizuk* from being in a wonderful program.

Harav Larry Rothwachs of Teaneck then spoke about one of the *bnei*

kehillah, Reb Shelly Mermelstein, an avid participant of Daf Hashovua, who was tragically taken from this world a few months ago, and the next Maseches Yevamos is dedicated in his name.

The strength in pushing oneself to constantly review brings a great *kvod Shamayim* and the person who does that is deserving of royalty, just as Rus is called "*eim hamalchus*" — mother of kings.

Harav Yosef Elefant, a *Maggid Shiur* in Mir Yerushalayim, congratulated the *mesaymim* and offered some advice for *Seder Nashim*.

A video of "Around the World" was played during the *siyum*, with short

clips of people from all parts of the globe explaining how Daf Hashovua has had a positive change on their communities. A doctor from Vancouver explained how joining Daf Hashovua was his first step into *Gemara*, while a Rav from Texas said that his congregation's social media was used solely to share thoughts on the weekly *Daf*.

As the siyum came to an end, there is no question that the chizuk received by all the individuals and groups watching together (where legal) will take them into Maseches Yevamos and keep up their desire for the words of our Holy Torah, even in these trying times. FBI Arrests Self-Proclaimed White Supremacist in Alleged Plot To Blow Up Historic Synagogue

The FBI arrested a self-proclaimed white supremacist for planning to blow up a historic Colorado synagogue and poison congregants, federal officials said Monday. The FBI called the alleged plot a hate crime and an act of domestic terrorism.

Richard Holzer, 27, was arrested Friday night after picking up what he thought was a bundle of pipe bombs and dynamite from undercover agents, according to an affidavit filed in federal court in Denver. He was wearing a Nazi armband when he was arrested and carrying a copy of "Mein Kampf," FBI Special Agent John Smith wrote in the filing.

Investigators said Holzer wanted to blow up the Temple Emanuel synagogue in Pueblo, Colorado. The structure is the state's second-oldest synagogue and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Holzer was set to be arraigned Monday afternoon on a

charge of attempting to obstruct people from exercising their religion through force, and of attempted use of explosives and fire. He faces up to 20 years in prison.

Agents said they started tracking Holzer more than a month ago after noticing his hate-filled, anti-Semitic social media posts.

An undercover agent posing as a white supremacist reached out to Holzer on Facebook in late September, investigators said. After sending the agent pictures of himself holding guns and wearing swastikas and other white supremacist paraphernalia, Holzer bragged that he had tried to poison the water at the synagogue in 2018, according to the affidavit. Investigators said he told the agent that he paid a cook to put arsenic in the water pipes and that he intended to do it again on Halloween.

His goal, according to the affidavit, was to "make them know they're not wanted here."

According to the affidavit, Holzer used several Facebook accounts to promote white supremacy and racist violence in direct messages and group chats.

"I wish the Holocaust really did happen," he allegedly said in one message. "They need to die."

He also allegedly sent pictures of himself posing with handguns and semiautomatic rifles while dressed in clothing featuring what FBI agents described as "white supremacy

In other messages, he said he hated Jews "with a passion" and spoke about how he wanted to "die in a cop Shoot out," according to the FBI.

Project Witness Second Annual Nationwide School Competition Now Open to Students

On Tuesday evening, October 29, Project Witness formally introduced its second annual nationwide school competition at its first educational webinar of this academic year. The competition topic, She'eiris Hapleitah, offers students the opportunity to explore the lives and experiences of those who not only survived the Holocaust, but who ultimately, and miraculously, breathed life again into a world of Judaism that had almost disappeared.

In a fascinating and informative webinar session, replete with carefully researched information on the topic. Mrs. Nechama Mirsky, associate principal of general studies at Shevach High School. presented a deeply emotional lecture that commemorated the 75th anniversary of liberation from the horrors or Nazi control and took note of the resulting amazing growth of a close-to-decimated

In her presentation, Mrs. Mirsky stressed the importance of the critical survival activities of the heroes and her-

oines of this particular time. Building a world after the war was a massive undertaking that was dealt with on many levels: by devastated and bereft survivors; by spiritual leaders who, despite personal losses, dedicated themselves to the rebuilding process; and by individuals who had not experienced the Holocaust personally, but who recognized the need and engaged in comprehensive chessed from far-away countries on behalf of the She'eiris Hapleitah in the displaced per-

Mrs. Mirsky posed significant questions that will permeate the competition: How did this bereaved generation rebuild their shattered world? How can we repay them for what they did for today's generations? She offered potential answers to these questions by discussing the ways the survivors and those who assisted them addressed the multiple physical and spiritual issues facing them.

In her creative approach, Mrs. Mirsky spoke eloquently about the three pillars of Yiddishkeit that became the foundations of the about-to-be-newly-constructed world after war. She stressed

how each of these three traditional pillars that have kept our nation alive in the past - Torah, avodah and gemilus chassadim — provided the basis of the new world and how each one of the pillars had a special place in the rebuilding

Details of the Torah, the tefillah and the chessed that existed in the displaced persons camps and that are brilliantly depicted by Mrs. Mirsky in the Project Witness Competition booklet will provide the webinar's participants and their students with priceless information. Not only will the courage and determination of this era become familiar in classrooms, but students will also be motivated to creatively translate this bravery into a "reality" that will connect them on a personal and emotional level to what was achieved, even though such feats were considered well-nigh impossible at

Using the information that will be provided to competition participants and following suggested prompts as to what kinds of projects will be most effective, it is anticipated that many hundreds of students will find themselves inspired and moved to use their talents to convev a universal message to their fellow students, teachers, parents and grandparents.

Based on last year's exceptional results, it is expected that this year's enhanced material and its comprehensive creative suggestions will attract an even larger group of participants. Schools and students who register for the competition will receive broadly-ranging information about the topic of She'eiris Hapleitah that will provide fertile ground for creative endeavors in areas such as literature, art, music and graphic arts.

Prizes will be awarded to winning entries in each category and a public showing of exhibits will take place on Asarah B'Teves. In addition, the list of winners will be recognized in Hamodia and award-winning submissions will be

Yad Sarah Opens Two New Branches Providing Vital Health and Social Services in Israel

Akko branch serves one of Israel's most diverse cities; Tiberias site is Yad Sarah's 13th hospital branch.

Pad Sarah today announced its opening of two new branches, which will provide a vital array of free or low-cost health and home-care support services for people of all ages, marking the latest growth point for Israel's largest volunteer-staffed organization.

The new Yad Sarah branch in Akko (Acre) will offer equipment lending, an equipment repair workshop, emergency alarm response, legal services, and wheelchair-accessible transportation in one of Israel's most diverse cities. Seventy-two percent of Akko's 55,000 residents are Jews, 25 percent are Muslim Arabs, and 2 percent are Christian Arabs, while almost 25 percent are new immigrants.

Located in a former air-raid shelter, the branch will significantly expand access to social services in a socioeconomically challenged area, as Akko residents previously needed to travel to Nahariya or Kiryat Motzkin to receive assistance from Yad Sarah — or missed out on the aid altogether.

In Tiberias, meanwhile, Yad Sarah has opened its 13th hospital-based branch at Poriyah Hospital. Yad Sarah's hospital branches make it easier for patients and families to borrow equipment upon discharge. The organization also operates branches at Assouta Ashdod Hospital in Ashdod, Beilinson Hospital in Petach Tikvah, Hadassah Medical Center's Mount Scopus and Ein Karem sites in Jerusalem, HaEmek Hospital in Afula, Hillel Yaffa Hospital in Hadera, Ichilov Hospital in Tel Aviv, Rambam Hospital in Haifa, Shaarei Zedek Medical Center in Jerusalem, Soroka Hospital in Be'er Sheva, Western Galilee Hospital in Nahariya, and Ziv Hospital in Tzefat.

The new branches in Akko and Tiberias represent the latest venues which will mobilize the energy and passion of Yad Sarah's corps



of 7,000-plus volunteers, who help provide access to medical equipment loans, drive wheelchair-accessible vans, reach out to the homebound, advocate for the elderly, serve children with special needs, and perform a wide array of other services for more than 600,000 people in Israel annually.

In yet another new development for Yad Sarah, the organization's Kiryat Motzkin branch has moved to a nearby mall. It is the third Yad Sarah branch situated in a commercial shopping area, with these centrally-located sites offering their surrounding communities relatively easy access to social services.

The seforim stores have pledged to gift every participant with a sefer."

Perhaps the words penned by Rav Chaim Kanievsky in a letter to French Jewry best encapsulate the importance of the Torah revolution taking place in France, "The hands of the activists of Dirshu led by Rav Dovid Hofstedter should be strengthened at the gathering of Daf Yomi maggidei shiur, led by Hagaon HaTzadik Rav Chizkiyahu Mishkovsky, shlita, in the city of the Baalei Tosafos - Paris.... may the zechus of the Baalei Tosafos, who illuminated Paris with their Torah and yirah, ensure that Torah should not be forgotten in Yisrael...

Honoring an Officer 78 Years Later

On Monday, July 15, at 5 p.m., I will be hosting a street co-naming ceremony in honor of fallen Jewish police officer Leon Fox. In 1941, Officer Fox was a patrolman assigned to NYPD's 60th Precinct. While escorting a theater manager to deposit his day's earnings, Officer Fox was shot and killed.

More than 78 years later, another Jewish police officer assigned to the 60th Precinct, Albert Mammon, told me Officer Fox's story and urged me to preserve his memory and his sacrifice.

It is important that we, as a community, stand in support of our finest, especially now during a wave of NYPD suicides. I encourage readers to join me, along with Police Commissioner O'Neill and the 85-year-old son of Officer Fox, at the Monday ceremony honoring him at the intersection of Surf Avenue and West 12th St. – the location where Officer Fox was gunned down in February 1941.

Is It the Shamir?

We should be strengthened by this discovery, and may we soon merit to see the fulfillment of the final verses of *Yechezkel* 39: "when I have brought them back from amongst the people and gathered them out of the lands of their enemies...I will never again hide My face from them."


Even as they reflected soberly on the past, guests also honored the yeshivah's future. This year's MTI dinner celebrated

On his way from Bozeman, Montana to his home in Yerushalayim on Sunday, February 10, noted former refusnik Rabbi Yosef Mendelevitch realized that he had an eight-hour stopover in Minneapolis. Never one to waste time, Rabbi Mendelevitch graciously offered to visit the community and shared some remarks. The arrangements were quickly made and over 150 people gathered at Congregation Bais Yisroel on short notice to hear the personal struggles of this Jewish hero.

Rabbi Mendelevitch, in his humble and witty way, told of his underground Jewish activism in Soviet Russia and his repeated attempts to escape. When a scheme to hijack an aircraft was discovered by the KGB, Reb Yosef faced the prospect of the death penalty but ultimately served eleven years in Soviet prison. He displayed superhuman strength and will while fiercely holding onto his

Judaism.

Those in the audience were visibly moved by the sacrifices Rabbi Mendelevitch made to wear a *yarmulke*, keep kosher and be *shomer Shabbos*. A hunger strike and international pressure ultimately had Rabbi Mendelevitch released and "expelled" to Israel in 1981.

Torah Academy Participates in Nationwide Anti-Bullying Effort Through Song

To further its impact, the song composition includes a 1001-child choir made up of hundreds of students from Jewish schools around the nation, featuring Torah

In addition, Torah Academy has a warm, ongoing relationship with Yochi Briskman of Project Productions, a top-echelon Jewish music producer who has produced several TABR Chanukah concerts, who turned to TABR when it came time to create a music video to complement the song. TABR's Middle School boys are featured performers in the video, which was recorded on TABR's middle school campus.

"Simcha Leiner's music is heard around the Jewish world, and it is incredibly meaningful that he is using his platform to focus on how we can all treat each other better, and refuse to tolerate bullying wherever it may happen. Siyumim at Homes of HaGaonim HaRav Gershon Edelstein, HaRav Shalom Cohen & the Sanzer Rebbe, as Dirshu Marches Towards Next Year's World Siyum By Chaim Gold

The simple home of HaGaon HaRav Gershon Edelstein, shlita, venerated senior Rosh Yeshiva of Ponovezh, is not usually a venue for public celebrations. The Rosh Yeshiva is well known for the privacy he maintains and for eschewing the public spotlight. Nevertheless, for every rule there is an exception. Recently, with the completion of hilchos Shabbos in the Dirshu Daf HaYomi B'Halacha cycle, Rav Gershon not only agreed to host a siyum in his apartment but he went out of his way to address the siyum and give guidance to the wider community on the importance of learning practical *halacha* on a regular basis.

Rav Gershon: Learning Mishnah Berurah Daily is mamesh spiritual hatzalos nefashos!

The siyum at the home of Rav Gershon was attended by numerous Gedolei Torah and Rabbonim including HaGaon HaRav Chaim Feinstein, shlita, Rosh Yeshiva of Yeshiva Ateres Shlomo, HaGaon HaRav Boruch Dov Diskin, shlita, Rosh Yeshiva at Yeshiva Orchos Torah, and numerous other Roshei Yeshiva.

Without a doubt, the highlight of the event were the words of the nonagenarian senior Rosh Yeshiva, Rav Gershon.



"There is no need to give divrei bracha at such an event, because the bracha has already been promised by Chazal, who teach, 'He who learns halacha every day is assured a place in Olam Habaah,.' Thus, the bracha is assured."

The Rosh Yeshiva continued, "With regard, however, to halacha, it is important for everyone to know that learning halacha every day is an obligation. It is a tremendous obligation to specifically learn practical halacha. The volume of Orach Chaim in Shulchan Aruch is the volume that one must know and utilize every day. The laws of brachos, how to get dressed, even what a person should think...

"That is why it is so important to learn Mishnah Berurah every day. Learning Mishnah Berurah is mamesh spiritual

hatzalos nefashos! It enables a person to fulfill the obligations that he is supposed to fulfill and not transgress the prohibitions that he is mandated to refrain from."

Sanzer Rebbe: First and Foremost, A Yid Must Conduct Himself Like a Yid!

The home of the Sanzer Rebbe is no stranger to Dirshu. The Rebbe has been an enthusiastic supporter of Dirshu from its inception and sees it as a fitting tribute to his father, the previous Sanzer-Klausenberger Rebbe, who established Mifal Hashas, a learning and testing regiment to promote and encourage the learning and knowledge of all of Shas.

Aside from the Sanzer Rebbe, shlita. the event was attended by HaGaon HaRav Yigal Rozen, shlita, Rosh Yeshiva of Yeshiva Ohr Yisrael of Petach Tikva, HaGaon HaRav Mordechai Mintzburg, shlita, Rav of the K'hal Adas Yerushalayim Masmidim community, Rav Dovid Hofstedter, Nasi of Dirshu and numerous others.

In his remarks, the Sanzer Rebbe quoted the Shulchan Aruch Harav in Hilchos Talmud Torah that says, "A person who is not able to learn all day, should learn the halachos that are relevant for him to know in the course of his daily life.' A Yid must know halacha, if not, he cannot conduct himself as a Yid," the Rebbe said. "That is what the Shulchan Aruch Harav is telling us. First and foremost, you must conduct yourself like a Yid and therefore, the absolute first thing you need to learn is halacha l'maaseh. The minimum is learning Kitzur Shulchan Aruch but certainly, learning Mishnah Berurah is better."

Rav Yigal Rozen said, "For those who learn all day, their main learning is Gemara. Nevertheless, the shaar, the entranceway to the bais medrash of Gemara, Rashi and Tosafos is learning and knowing halacha."

Rav Dovid Hofstedter said that before Yaakov Avinu went down to Egypt with his family he sent his son Yehuda ahead of him. Why? The Midrash states, that Yehuda went first in order to open a Beit Talmud - a Yeshiva, from where Torah rulings would come forth. The Midrash is telling us two things: There is a Yeshiva, but there is also the additional component of a place from where Torah rulings will emanate. Any new place to where Jews come, our sages are telling us, must first have both a yeshiva and a place where one can receive halachic rulings and halachic guidance from our sages.

"Why," Rav Hofstedter asked, "did Yaakov Avinu specifically send Yehuda? If he wanted to build a yeshiva he should have perhaps sent an architect and a developer? The answer," he posited, "is that Yehuda is the power of malchus, the power of a king. Whenever there is something good happening, the satan, the yetzer hara tries to get in the way. Yehuda has the power of malchus, a power that can counter the yetzer hara's diabolical plans.

"This too is why we feel so fortunate to be here at the home of the Sanzer Rebbe, shlita and why Dirshu is fortunate to have the blessing and constant support of other leading Gedolei Yisrael. With their backing, their merit and their tefillos we will certainly overcome any hurdles that the yetzer hara places in the way."

Learning HOW to Understand the Halacha

There was also a siyum at the home of HaGaon Hacham Shalom Cohen, shita, Rosh Yeshiva of Yeshiva Porat Yosef. "Some might say that the Mishnah Berurah is a sefer written for Ashkenazim not for Sephardim. After all, we rule in accordance with Maran, the Bet Yosef, and they rule in accordance with the Remah. What then," Rav Shalom asked, "would be the point of learning the Mishnah Berurah when its laws are not written in accordance with the Sephardic halachic rulings?"

He answered, "When one learns the Mishnah Berurah, one can truly understand the underlying premise of the halachah. I always tell my talmidim that although we Sephardim do not rule like the Mishnah Berurah, they should first learn the Mishnah Berurah and then learn the final outcome of the Sephardic poskim. After all, the Mishnah Berurah teaches you how to understand the halacha, not just what the halacha is.

"The Bracha is Min Hashomayim!"

At the siyum on Chelek Gimmel held at the Dirshu Convention in Stamford Connecticut, a few weeks ago, Rav Gershon Edelstein delivered an unexpected video message to the thousands of participants, expressing his joy over the fact that they were celebrating the completion of Chelek Gimel and beginning Chelek Daled of Mishnah Berurah.

When Rav Gershon was told about the multitudes of lomdei Dirshu who will be completing Shas next year with bechinos and that Dirshu would celebrate their accomplishments with massive siyumim in Eretz Yisroel, England, France and South Africa, culminating in an enormous siyum at the Prudential Center in Newark, NJ, in mid-February, 2020, the Rosh Yeshiva expressed his great joy. He pointed out that when a large, public siyum is made, it encourages more people to learn. He brought proof to this concept from a passuk in Mishlei [1:20], 'Wisdom sings out in the streets; it gives forth its voice in public.' Rav Edelstein explained, "When wisdom is being praised in the street it gives forth a voice in public that influences others."

When asked to give a bracha in honor of next year's Siyum HaShas, the Rosh Yeshiva answered, "The bracha is min hashomayim! Hashem blesses those who learn Torah. My bracha is that you should have siyatta d'shmaya in everything that you do!"

The Torah characterizes womanhood as being predicated upon two defining principles: eizer kenegdo, "a helper corresponding to him," i.e., providing the environment for a good marriage, and the ability to address various issues as they surface; eim kol chai, "mother of all living" - raising children in accordance with the hallowed mesorah, tradition, of our ancestors who used the Torah as their lodestar. A married woman must maintain two foci: wife and mother. Everything else, be it for economic or self-fulfilling reasons, are fringe benefits for one who has successfully navigated and excelled at the first two critical principles of womanhood.

My sister-in-law, Mrs. Ruchie Scheinbaum a"h, hailed from a generation that placed husband and children on a level of distinction superseding all else - even herself. She lived for her husband and children, savoring every moment and every nachas, relishing in and delighting from their reciprocated love. A successful wife and mother is no simple feat. It is a daunting task that requires constant devoted and vigilant attention, accompanied by a positive and loving attitude and demeanor. Ruchie exemplified the womanhood role both as a devoted and loving wife and as a doting, caring and wise mother. She achieved this with a positive outlook and a constant smile.

Women were granted a unique and special brocha to recite every day: she'asani kirtzono, "For having made me according to His will." Unlike the brocha of "Shelo asani isha - For He did not make me a woman," the woman's brocha is positive/ affirmative in nature. Why does a woman accentuate the positive, in contrast with a man, whose blessing focuses on the negative? Rav Mordechai Eliyahu explains that prior to creating Adam HaRishon, Hashem "consulted" with the malachim, who raised their opposing doubts concerning man's spiritual viability. Hashem did not listen to their views and created man. Regarding the creation of Chavah, Hashem did not turn to the malachim. Her creation was unopposed, and solely according to the will of Hashem. Chavah, who represents womanhood, from her initial creation was a manifestation of ratzon Hashem. Thus, all women affirm the positive nature of their origin when they recite their brachos daily.

My sister-in-law, Ruchie, bespoke this positive nature in her interrelationships with adults, in her positive mentoring of her students, and especially in the manner that she raised and educated her children. Never one to raise her voice or exhibit a negative countenance, her signature smile characterized her relationships, both positive and adverse. If there was a hurdle to scale, she surmounted it. If there was a challenge to overcome, she defeated it. It was this productive outlook on life that she infused into her children. Ruchie's home was a happy place, because she made it

that way. Her life was not a bed of roses, but one would never know it. During the summer, she was the "first lady" of Camp Kol Torah. As a member of the staff commented, "She was so welcoming, so caring about our families, always with a smile." She never looked askance at anyone, and always saw a positive side to everything and everyone.

Family was her life and she spent every waking moment involved with her children and her growing family of grandchildren - and it showed. Ruchie passed away right after we read Parshas Yisro, the parsha of Kabbolas HaTorah: "Ko somar leBais Yaakov vesagid livnei Yisroel, "So shall you say to the House of Yaakov and relate to the Bnei Yisroel" (Shemos 19:3). Bais Yaakov refers to the women, hence the term amirah, say, which is a mild form of speech, best suited to a woman's compassionate and maternal nature. Women set the tone in the home and are the ones who impart the love of Torah to their offspring. Haggadah, sagid, is the tone of speech that implies firmness, and is the manner in which the men - the focus of haggadah - should teach the mitzvos to their children.

At Maamad Har Sinai, Klal Yisroel heard the Kol Hashem, Voice of G-d, and also experienced these words mitoch ha'eish, amidst the fire. Both the Ramban and Rabbeinu Bachya comment that in transmitting Torah to our children, we must convey to them both of these components: the Voice and the Fire. The Voice is taught by instruction, an obligation for which the father is best suited. The Fire of Sinai, with its unprecedented hisgalus, Revelation of the Glory of Hashem, is not merely instructed, but must be lived and conveyed by example. Emunah in Hashem is the foundation of Jewish life. This is taught lovingly by the mother, who serves as a living example.

Ruchie was an exemplar par excellence of the Yiddishe mama to whom davening and Tehillim were second nature. Her incredible emunah was bequeathed to her by her parents, Shraga Feivel and Rosa Botknecht. Survivors of the Gehinnom that decimated European Jewry, they came to these shores to build their lives. Sadly, her father's life was cut short, but his lessons of emunah were not. Her mother, tichyeh, is a fierce believer in Hashem. When she was informed of the tragic news of the sudden passing of her oldest child, she reacted at first as any parent would. Then her Jewish stoicism kicked in and she said, "Mir fregen nisht kein shaalos oifin Ribbono Shel Olam. We do not question the Creator." This was the home from which Ruchie hailed. This is how she lived. This is what she imparted to her children.

To raise eleven children to adulthood and see Torah *nachas* from each one is an achievement extraordinaire. My brother is a wonderful father: devoted, caring, and loving. He is always there whenever needed. After years in *kollel*, he sought a livelihood. It meant being on the road a good part of the week, regardless of the season or conditions. Summer was devoted to running his premier camp. He taught his children by example, on *Shabbos*, *Yom Tov* and some days of the week. Ruchie was home all of the time, except when she was teaching in school. As mother and sometime "father," she achieved remarkable results: *bonim uvnei vonim oskim baTorah*; *bonim rabbonon vechasni rabbonon*.

When my brother spoke at the *levayah*, among the many truthful accolades that he said was, "I lost my best friend." How true! One can be married for years and do all of the right things, but not everyone achieves "best friend" status. How beautiful and meaningful a statement. Perhaps I may add the following: When the Vilna Gaon lost his *rebbetzin*, he was obviously distraught. He was the gadol hador, so it stands to reason that his wife and closest confidante must have been on a very lofty spiritual plateau. What about her was so special? Surely she was a baalas chesed, a devoted wife, and an outstanding mother. What unique epitaph did he inscribe for the special woman who achieved the apex of Jewish womanhood as a mother and wife? He wrote on her tombstone: "Lo hinicha acharah kemosah. She left no other like herself." No one could replace her. What a special tribute to a wife. Veritably, the Gaon was a man who shunned verbosity of any sort, but why did he not add a few comments about her chesed, emes, tefillah, yiras Shomayim?

I think the Gaon was teaching us an important lesson regarding the attitude and esteem in which one should hold his wife: *Lo hinicha acharah kemosah*. There is no one like my wife.

My brother felt this way about his wife of forty-three years.

My sister-in-law would worry about her husband, children, grandchildren, mother, brothers, sister and extended family. She worried about her friends. Ruchie had Tehillim lists, chesed lists, and special request lists for people who were in need. I often told her that she worried too much. Now her neshamah tehorah has returned to her Father in Heaven. It may have been too short a journey, but she was eminently successful nonetheless, leaving this world with an enviable *sheim tov* of outstanding achievement. Now she should worry. She should worry for all of us who are bereft of her love and friendship. Now her worry and prayers will be beneficial.

May Liba Rochel *bas* Shraga Feivel be a *melitzas yosher* for her husband who lost more than his best friend - he lost the foundation of his life - and for her children, who lost their quintessential mother; for her mother and family who are brokenhearted over their loss, as well as for her extended family and friends whose lives will forever be etched with her memory.

"Detroit Hatzalah is comprised of individuals from every corner of our community, who are volunteering their time in dedication to hatzalos nefashos, the saving of lives in our community," read a statement announcing the "go-live." "With first responders living throughout

the community, our goal is to be on the scene within 120 seconds of dispatch."

While Detroit has been home to an Orthodox community for over a century, in recent years, it has blossomed anew and is now home to some 2,000 families.

"Baruch Hashem, in the last five to 10 years, with the help of the kollelim and mosdos, the community has grown a lot, but part of being a kehillah is having Hatzalah, so a couple of us got to work and made it happen," a Detroit Hatzalah board member, one

Detroit Hatzalah began taking calls officially at midnight this past Motzoei Shabbos. Currently, they are not providing transport, but only serving as first responders to the scene of emergencies. When necessary, a local ambulance agency will provide transport once patients are stabilized.

Members of Chicago Hatzalah provided guidance over the last few months to help with the many
