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# FEATURED TORAH Message

We find ourselves in the days of sefira, during which we mourn the loss of 24,000 students of Rabbi Akiva. The Gemara tells us that the reason for which Hashem decided to plague the talmidim was because they didn't show each other the proper respect. Although their lack of respect for each other was obviously so infinitesimal, that only Hashem, the Bochen Levavos, could detect it, it has become a custom of Klal Yisrael to introspect and attempt to improve our bein adam lechaveiro during this period.

Rav Isaac Sher, the Rosh Yeshiva of the Slabodka Yeshiva, offers an explanation as to the source of this lack of love:

The Gemara in Yevamos states that the second Beis Hamikdash was destroyed due to sinas chinam - baseless hatred. The Me'iri cryptically explains that it was because there was no longer nevuah during the time of the second Beis Hamikdash.

What does the end of prophecy have to do with baseless hatred?

Rav Sher explains that true love comes from an appreciation of one another. Love stems from a recognition of what

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### THOUGHTS on the PARSHA

### Calev Kornblum, 11th grade

In this week's Parsha, the Torah describes the different types of צרעת a person can get. The Torah delineates first the צרעת of the body, then the צרעת of clothing, and finally of the house. However, ל"ל tell us that this was not actually the sequence of events. First, a person's home would be stricken with צרעת, then his clothing, and finally, his body. This begs the question: Why didn't the Torah say it in the proper order?

The קטץ יוסץ explains that the Torah is teaching us a valuable lesson. Really, a person who is worthy of צרעת should get it on his body alone; therefore, the Torah puts the body first. But out of the kindness of Hashem, it affects the clothing first, and even before that, the house, to give the person time to do תשובה. This understanding can also be used to explain why the Torah uses the לשון, which implies a gift, when describing the אונתתי of צרעת Hashem is giving us the gift of a warning. This also fits beautifully with the way that "ער explains what would happen when a person went through this. Hashem would ensure that there was no monetary loss from the צרעת of the house, because when they went to remove the affected stones, they would find treasures previously

hidden by the כנענים as a compensation from Hashem for the stones they removed. Hashem's kindness goes even further. The מדרש תנחומא explains that the kindness of the צרעת affecting the house and clothing before the person is not afforded to non-jews. We see by פעוק that the erus says, את פרעה - Hashem afflicted Pharaoh, and only later does it say He struck his house. According to the say He struck his house. According to the first, just like it was with פרעה. Yet, due to Hashem's overflowing ישראל, He reversed the order for us.

When we look into this, we find something truly astounding. This was all done for someone deserving of צרעת, someone who had sinned! Hashem goes to great lengths to be kind to him and cause him to do תשובה, afflicting first his house, compensating him, then his clothes, and only after that does He let the affliction reach his body. All of this was for a sinner. Hashem loves each and every one of us so dearly that He will spare no expense to help us return to Him. This week's parsha shows us that even when we sin, Hashem still desperately wants to have a relationship with us, so he sends us signs to help us to repent. They are there, and all we have to do is make sure to look.

each human being is - a Tzelem Elokim - and that we, Klal Yisrael, are children of Hashem. When we truly appreciate that we are all His children, then we will feel like and relate to one another as brothers.

However, with the end of nevuah, we lost our emunah chushis—a tangible, felt sense of Hashem's presence in our daily lives. As that awareness faded, so too did our collective sense of achdus. It became increasingly difficult to feel like we shared the same Father, resulting in a distancing from one another.

This is the challenge and the opportunity

of sefira. The more we attach ourselves to Hashem—through learning His Torah, fulfilling His mitzvos, and deepening our emunah—the more we reignite that sense of shared identity. When we strengthen our relationship with Hashem, we will inevitably strengthen our relationship with each other. Our actions, our words, and even our inner thoughts toward one another can be uplifted and refined.

May these days of sefira inspire us to draw closer to both Hashem and our fellow Jews. And may we be Zoche to witness "Chaverim Kol Yisrael" in our lifetime, Bimheira Biyameinu.

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
